Early Literacy: The Foundation For Success

Because early literacy skills are the foundation of all learning in school, children who start school with strong literacy skills have a lifelong advantage. And, even beyond school success, many of those skills needed for reading and writing are also important in developing the listening, speaking, and social skills needed to function well in society.

We know that a child's first three years are a critical period when the brain is primed for the development of language. If language development is nurtured, language will develop. If not, the window of opportunity closes, and "The brain cells that would have been nurtured and developed start to fade away."1

The pandemic interrupted and delayed the development of language and literacy skills for many young children. "About a third of children in the youngest grades are missing reading benchmarks, up significantly from before the pandemic."²

There are so many benefits to reading to your child. It helps their brain develop, increases vocabulary, sparks curiosity, strengthens concentration, and helps them be ready for school.

From the start, we knew our boys were capable of many great things, but needed to be nurtured to do them. We believe that all children deserve the best possible start in life. Researchers and teachers agree: the best possible start requires the early literacy skills that lead to school success.

The Early Childhood Resource Center is working hard, and partnering throughout our communities, to bring numerous services and resources to families and educators:

- Since 2003, the SPARK kindergarten readiness program has helped more than 17,000 Ohio families get ready for kindergarten.
- Over the past year, we've trained and coached hundreds of educators on how to strengthen the early literacy skills of young children.
- We're currently working with 30 child care centers to train and coach teachers to implement best-practice literacy strategies.
- We help to build children's home libraries: in our Canton location, there's a bottomless book drawer. At every single visit, a child can choose their very own book to keep.

The future looks bright: every day, we're bringing even more supports to even more children, families, and educators throughout our six-county service area. We're so grateful we have the opportunity to make the best possible start a reality.

EDUCATION IN ACTION

A Shining Star in Akron

Glory Hallelujah Childcare is truly a blessing for Akron children and families. Margo Slaughter opened her child care center in 2003 with a mission of serving all families and children who have been displaced or expelled because of disability, barriers, behavioral challenges, or academic concerns,

Ms. Margo, as she's known, said the name *Glory Hallelujah* exemplifies how she feels about serving God's children. She believes the name brings together glorious and highest praise, which symbolizes her commitment to her mission.

In March, our staff had the opportunity to participate in a Seussical Birthday Celebration at Glory Hallelujah. The Seuss-themed day included a fully decorated classroom, costumes, and hands-on activities. Ms. Margo said, "I love Dr. Seuss. I believe children need to be encouraged to read at an early age."

This event is just one example of Ms. Margo's continued commitment to family engagement and to fostering the learning experiences that lead to success.

The Early Childhood Resource Center first started working with Ms. Margo through GAR Foundation's Supporting Teachers and Ready Students (STARS) initiative. We provide professional development and intensive coaching on language, literacy, and math for 23 urban Akron child care programs. In this second phase of the initiative, the programs also receive training and coaching on the strategies, supports, and resources that support kindergarten readiness.

When asked about the coaching supports she receives from the STARS initiative, Ms. Margo said, "I appreciate Elizabeth Schilling so much; I don't know what I would do without her. I wear so many hats and she has helped me with so many out of the box ideas to build quality in my program. She is so wonderful!"

Ms. Margo is a great example of the unwavering commitment that so many of our early childhood professionals live each day. We are so proud of Ms. Margo and the impact she continues to make on Akron's youngest children. +

It Takes a Village to Raise Children

"It takes a village to raise children," according to Gail Tigner of Nana's Babies. "Teachers and working parents cannot do it alone. Children deserve to learn, pass their subjects, and excel in life."

Nana's Babies is a licensed family child care home in Youngstown that provides care for children from 6-12 years of age. Gail opened her family child care home in December 2020, after seeing first-hand how her grandchildren were struggling in school during the pandemic. Upon retirement from her teaching career at Youngstown City Schools, she decided to pursue her passion of helping school-age children succeed

She broadens learning and discovery by using the resources available right in her community:

Stabilization grant funding from the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services has helped expand the learning as well, by allowing Gail to purchase technology to support lessons.

Gail continues to provide lots of supports that mitigate pandemic-related learning loss for the children entrusted to her care. She offers a great example: a child care provider collaborating with schools and community partners to create wraparound supports that help children thrive. +

WE SUGGEST: Goodnight Moon by Margaret Wise Brown: Of the many children's books that I've read to my kids at home and my "work kids," Goodnight Moon has been a constant favorite. While I can recite several children's books by memory, Goodnight Moon is a magical, lyrical bedtime homage to the comforting things that surround the child. Neither I nor my children ever tired of hearing those everyday things listed so magically, nor did we ever read the book without looking at those illustrations. One of the things I miss most about having very young children is the bedtime routine that starts with the bedtime prayer, and includes the reading of this book before the goodnight kiss. A book that was written more than 50 years ago that still retains its popularity is a book that speaks to the essence of a child and parent's safe, predictable and loving bedtime routine.

In January 2021, Gail began working with Early Childhood Specialist MaryBeth Bush, who helped her earn her first star with Ohio's Step Up to Quality rating system. Gail recently applied for five stars; it's the highest possible rating.

Gail became determined to extend the children's knowledge beyond the classroom, especially in literacy, math, and social studies. Her goal? "To strengthen the home-school connection."

 Gail reaches out to teachers at Hubbard Middle School to ensure her lessons complement what the children are learning in the classroom, and to address individual children's challenges-academic, behavioral, and social-emotional. Gail also volunteers at the school, helping with fun learning activities and donating supplies.

• To help one child who was struggling with math, Gail reached out to the Hubbard Library for assistance with adding engaging math activities to her lesson plans.

• To help another child strengthen her literacy skills, Gail used the lending library at the McGuffey Centre. The McGuffey Centre offers lots of resources and activities, including a computer lab and before- and after-school programs. Its summer gardening project allows the children to plant, care for, harvest, and eat fresh produce. The children at Nana's Babies eagerly participate.

SPARK Supports Children's Continued Success

For some time, the independent evaluation team from Kent State University has been collaborating with the Ohio Department of Education to access data on the performance of SPARK children as they progress through school.

Preliminary data now confirms that the SPARK advantage

stays with children, supporting success in the elementary years. In the third grade, SPARK children are still significantly outperforming their peers—and attending school far more regularly.

Continued analysis will be needed in order to make a thorough study of the effects of SPARK participation. +
