



# If you're in the four-year-old program, you might be reading *The Little Red Hen.*

#### **Cooperation and Teamwork Activities to Try**

Play Follow the Leader. The leader gives simple commands for the players to follow (like touch your head or jump two times). This strengthens listening and cooperation skills. Be sure to change leaders, so your child gets a low-stakes chance to be in control.

Make a pizza together. Homemade pizza is simple if you buy premade dough at the supermarket. One person rolls out the dough. Another person spoons on the sauce. Someone else sprinkles on the cheese. Then it just needs to bake! As you eat, talk about how everyone's help was needed to produce a delicious meal.

**Sort clean laundry together.** This is a great way to teach your child to pitch in while practicing skills they'll need in kindergarten, like counting and sorting by color. Once all the laundry is sorted, point out how much faster the work went with more than one person — and how much more fun it was to do it together!

## **Making Virtual Learning Work**

It takes teamwork and planning.

# Stark County Parent Partner Cala Seifer tells the story of what it took to make virtual SPARK lessons work for one family:

This year, I'm working virtually with siblings: Qashay is in our fouryear-old program, and her younger brother Chazander is in our three-year-old program. Their mom, Johnetta, has been very gracious as we've navigated virtual lessons together.

Our virtual learning journey didn't start smoothly. The school district gave the family iPads and hotspots, but Johnetta wasn't sure how to connect for our lessons. We worked together to help her learn.

During lessons, Qashay and Chazander would move the iPad around or walk away from the camera, so we couldn't interact. Johnetta would get frustrated: she also has a baby to tend to!

I didn't feel much learning was taking place. Reading together (the activity that starts every SPARK lesson) just didn't seem possible.

Johnetta and I decided to make a plan. I gave her an instruction sheet with pictures to follow during lessons. We chose a table

where the iPad could stay in one place during the lesson. We also scheduled our lessons during



the baby's nap time, to keep things manageable. We decided Johnetta would hold the book and point out the illustrations as we read the story together.

I called Johnetta the day before to remind her of the upcoming visit, and texted her a few hours before the lesson.

We kept the lesson short and simple — and all of our planning SPARKed success! I could see the kids the entire time, distractions were minimized, and we easily flowed from activity to activity.

I was so impressed that I called Johnetta that evening to thank and compliment her. We're now on our way to doing lots of virtual learning activities together.


## **Henry: Excited to Learn**

When he first started with SPARK, Henry expressed enthusiasm for learning. He loved showing me that he could spell and sound out letters in his name, boldly and proud.

However, writing didn't come so easily. We worked hard to help him learn to hold his pencil correctly and keep it steady while he wrote his name. He's a tenacious learner who doesn't give up on the first or second try. He keeps at the task until he achieves his goal! After lots of hard work, now Henry can hold a pencil or crayon correctly, with guidance from me or his mom. We only have to remind him to *pinch* and he does a great job.

Henry loves to read; he will read a book with me, word for word. I'm so proud of how engaged and excited he is to learn.



## It's Kindergarten Registration Time!

Believe it or not, it's time to register for kindergarten! Speak with your SPARK parent partner or check your school district's website for instructions and updates.

#### Be ready! Work together to help your child:

- Know first and last name, birthday, address, and phone number
- Identify and name 10 colors
- Identify and name shapes
- Recognize uppercase and lowercase letters
- Retell stories in order (first...then...and then...)
- Use and follow location words (above, below, next to, near)
- Compare quantities (many, some, full, empty, less than, more than)

- Talk about qualities (big, small, quiet, noisy)
- Group objects by color, shape, and size
- Make rhyming pairs, like hat and bat
- · Recognize when words begin with the same sound
- Hold books properly
- Count to 20
- Read numbers 0 to 10
- Count 10 objects
- Think about and solve problems (how can we...?)
