



2024 Stark County Transition Skills Summary

Site-Based County Report

The Stark County Transition Skills Summary (TSS) is a strategic metric of the Great Start for Great Futures (GSGF) Coalition. GSGF is a group of Stark County early education providers, agencies, advocates, and community leaders collaborating to improve the outcomes of prenatal to kindergarten children. The work is funded through the support of Stark Education Partnership (SEP), the leadership of the Early Childhood Resource Center (ECRC) and State Support Team 9 (SST9). This spring, 2,266 children participated in the TSS in Stark County.

Below you will find a summary of the county averages for the general performance levels of students at all participating site-based preschools in the spring of 2024. These results are based on the teachers' observations and reports. These results are not an evaluation; they are one way to understand your program. Use these results to discuss what works best for the children you serve.
